Salt Lake City – National experts will meet Saturday morning, April 21, at Salt Lake’s St. Mark’s Episcopal Cathedral, to take an in-depth look at how poverty and the environment overlap and what can be done. Joining them will be Kim Lawton of PBS’s “Religion and Ethics NewsWeekly” for an international webcast originating from the historic cathedral.

The panel will include George Handley of Utah Interfaith Power and Light. In addition, panelists will discuss Salt Lake City’s role as an environmental justice pilot city.
